Turning local conversations into action

What we did in Waterloo

118 local people took part in the Listening to Waterloo conversations, sharing their experiences of what life is like in Waterloo (in the Dalton ward). 93 Place Standard assessments were completed by local people during the summer and autumn months of 2021. The majority of these were completed online, as face to face conversations were limited due to the restrictions of the pandemic. Over 600 homes were sent the Place Standard questionnaire twice, which people could return in a pre-paid envelope or complete it online.

When covid restrictions temporarily eased, two drop-in sessions took place where Dalton Councillors and Kirklees Council officers could have more in-depth conversations with local residents about what matters to them most. We shared the issues that people had raised so far and also listened to new ideas. The drop in sessions were held at Cottage Homes in Waterloo on 22nd and 28th July 2021 and over 30 residents took part.

A further drop-in session was held on 19th March 2022, which over 15 local residents attended. This included members of the newly formed Cottage Homes and Waterloo Tenants and Residents Association. We had more detailed conversations about prioritising the top issues and were able to start writing this local action plan, with additional input from other Kirklees Council services, including Housing, Highways, and Parks and Open Spaces. We also had input from representatives of two key voluntary organisations, Support to Recovery and the Huddersfield Mission.

We shared the Listening to Waterloo results with participants, including the top 5 issues for each theme.

Residents were asked to rank their top priority under each theme and to share any other ideas or solutions they may have, to inform the development of our action plan.



Strengths in Waterloo

Housing and community

Most people thought that there was a good mix of housing in private ownership in a good location which people took pride in and cared for. However, some run down ones were highlighted where either properties or gardens need attention. A lack of good quality affordable and secure rental property was mentioned either Council owned or private. Not enough homes for older residents was highlighted out and Cottage Homes were singled out as housing younger people at the expense of older people at odds with the original intention. Flats with multiple occupiers and short-term rentals leading to a high turnover of occupancy in some cases has led to a run-down appearance.

Suggestions from participants about Housing and community:

More houses of an appropriate size and cost should be made available for young couples and single parents. There should be more social housing, affordable housing and secure rental properties in the area. Liaise with Private Sector Housing Team to identify opportunities to link with landlords in the area.

Public transport

The issue mentioned by around half the respondents was the good and frequent bus services along Wakefield Road compared to the lack of services on Waterloo Road, causing residents a long walk to access public transport. However, the congested road leads to clustering of buses and timetable delays. Changes to some services disadvantaged residents and the 262 to Mirfield and Dewsbury was singled out as a service that was particularly missed. The high cost of bus fares was highlighted particularly when a family group travelled together.

Suggestions from participants about Public transport:

Potential for the Wakefield Bus Service to be diverted down Long Lane, onto Albany Road and Waterloo Road, to re-connect with Wakefield Road. This would provide a better and useful service taking traffic off a large section of Wakefield Road. Reinstate the 262 Bus service from Huddersfield to Mirfield, Dewsbury. Explore community transport schemes to enable more opportunities for residents to attend places in and near the ward at a lower cost.

Facilities and amenities

There is a good range of retail opportunities – large and small - and services available but no learning or financial services. A variety of amenities such as health services, hair and beauty, schools, nursery, chemist were highlighted as being handy. Too many takeaway premises were a common complaint, and a similar number of people mentioned the lack of cafes and restaurants for social interaction. The closure of the local gym had significantly reduced access to local fitness opportunities including swimming and as a space for general social interaction.

Suggestions from participants about Facilities and amenities:

A small library with a community shop or cafe would bring people together. This would be ideally placed on the precinct of shops on Wakefield Road, at Waterloo. It would be ideal to open the old Subway shop as a community café and library and get volunteers to run it.

Challenges and issues in Waterloo

Traffic and parking

In general it was felt there are just too many cars, making roads too busy to join or cross. Insufficient parking spaces and inconsiderate parking, for example on pavements, was mentioned in nearly all the comments made. It is clearly a major issue in the area, both in the retail and service areas and the residential streets. The reduction in air quality in the area due to standing traffic and the increased volume of vehicles was noted by at least 10 people, and was linked with noise made by speeding cars often at night.

Suggestions from participants about Traffic and parking:

There should be a yellow box at the junction coming out of Greenlea Court, so people can safely move out onto the main road. Introduce a filter lane at the traffic lights by Dominos, so people can turn right and pull into the shops if they are travelling in the direction of Huddersfield. Introduce traffic calming along Waterloo Road to prevent cars speeding. Introduce average speed cameras on Wakefield Road by Greenside, as the existing speed cameras do not deter people from speeding.

Waterloo Road would benefit from having a pinch point installed to curb over enthusiastic drivers' speeds. Sequence the traffic lights slightly longer to clear standing traffic quicker during rush hour, which will also reduce standing traffic which creates residential noise and poor air quality.

Parking on pavements - Issue notices or fines as this causes damage to pavements that are not built for the weight of vehicles and cost the council money to repair eventually.

Play and recreation

Most respondents described limited safe play areas, singling out particularly the lack of play opportunities for older children and teenagers. Parks were thought to be poorly equipped and maintained and some thought unsafe, due to unregulated behaviour issues and larger groups gathering. Most play equipment was aimed at young children and at least some were usable for younger supervised children. A few mentioned the recreation opportunities afforded by the natural landscape, but with the need for better maintenance and management. A lack of benches for rest and socialising was raised.

Suggestions from participants about Play and recreation:

More cycling facilities, such as a pump track for Mountain bikers, would be good. Land on Albany Road, at the end of Waterloo Road, could be turned into a sports or recreational area for football

and other activities, instead of being left in a neglected manner. Total Fitness has just closed down and would make an excellent community leisure facility, if Kirklees were to run it. Consider using Jarmain's as a recreation area for children. We need a play gym in the area with easy access, as there isn't one in Waterloo. Put school buildings and grounds to better use at evenings and weekends.

Social contact

Very few places were identified where people can meet up, either formally in groups or informally and incidentally. The lack of a community centre was highlighted and what cafes and pubs there are generally felt to be inadequate. Parks and open spaces are close by, but the lack of seating made social meetings less attractive. A small number of people felt the churches offered an opportunity to meet others. Any activities or groups meeting in the area are generally poorly advertised, meaning people don't always know they are happening.

Suggestions from participants about Social contact:

Could do with more coffee shops to sit in, or more community activities arranged to involve a variety of age ranges and various activities for people to join. Could the piece of land on the junction of Waterloo Road (garages) be used as a social cafe space? A soft play area is needed for the mothers, dads and kids, with easy access to that provision in Waterloo. Through sensitive managements, more should be offered at the housing complex for older people, like dancing, Pilates and other activities to keep their brains active.

Influence and sense of control

A number of comments reflected the feeling that residents were not being listened to, and when raised views were not acted on or taken into consideration. However, the number of resident responses show there is interest in offering opinions and getting involved in matters of interest to the community, with others mentioning they had given views on other services, such as health provision in the area. Some felt Councillors were visible and active in the area, including on social media, but others felt they could be seen more and that Council communication could be better.

Suggestions from participants about Influence and sense of control:

Being disabled I think I could put some input on what could be done for people getting around. Create a Facebook page for the Ward - need to highlight Waterloo more prominently, boost posts to engage and involve more people. Have more community activities. Would not know how to contact or meet with a local councillor if I needed advice, or to discuss an issue; would welcome a drop-in centre with fixed times. Invites to the local communities to meetings about what is happening in the area and involvement with decision making.
